

## **2015 Annual Report**

#### **MISSION STATEMENT:**

With a Christian focus, we will establish, sustain and strengthen programs and services that improve the quality of life, community and economy with an emphasis on West Michigan.

- Consistent with our mission, 97% and 93% of the grants in 2015 and 2014 stayed in West Michigan.
- The combined impact of Program Related Investments and Grants for the Grandville Avenue Initiative was \$559,000 in 2015 and \$318,000 in 2014.
- There were seventeen first time recipients (including ArtPrize, Geek Group, and World Concern) in 2015 up from fifteen in 2014.
- The number of organizations receiving funding in 2015 rose to 103 from 85 in 2014.
- 53% of the organizations receiving grants were Christian in 2015 v. 48% in 2014.
- Four multi-year pledges were awarded in 2015 as compared to eight in 2014.
- For 2015, the largest grant was \$250,000, the mean \$5,000 and the average \$32,400.





## Nature of 2015 Grants




The Foundation generally supports only pre-selected charities or those invited to make a proposal. Grants can be capital, project based or operating in nature.
